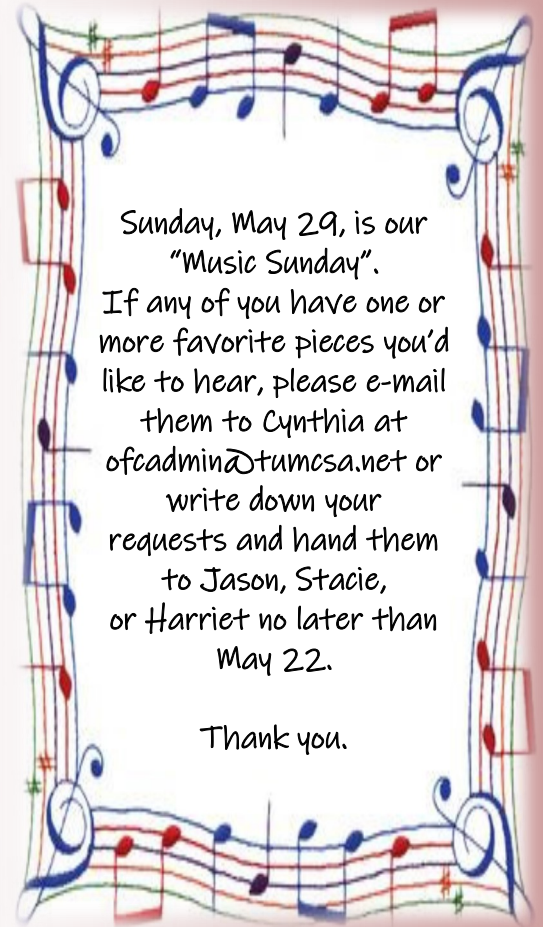


It's Spring

The other day I was watching some people running the yearly “Mount Cameroon race of Hope”- a marathon. I have never tried one, even as a teenager. Maybe I was scared of my output, or I just got connected to team sports more than individual sports. But marathons seem tough and longer, and it seems the mental toughness equates the physical to be able to start and end in record time.



However, I like watching marathons, maybe because it is a yearly event in my home town where over a thousand athletes from around the globe gather once every February to run up and down “the chariots of the Mountain of God,” as the Cameroon Mountain was named by the Portuguese in the fourteenth century. The starting point of this race is about 18 miles from the sea level, with the athletes running to the summit of the mountain that stood above sea level at 13,353 feet and back.

The race is expected to take approximately 8 hours, with runners passing through the city, before disappearing into the thick equatorial forest, the mountainous vegetation and the snow as they climb up the slope to the summit of the mountain. In about 4hrs and 32 minutes from the start as I watched, the champion appeared from the forest, tired and weak, and slowly running down the slope of the mountain into the presence of the first group of crowds. The drums beat, the flutes sang and the spectators danced.

His family and friends began to run with him on the sidewalk, offering him water to rehydrate and cheering him up. Then he gained speed and accelerated down the slope with strength. The police and the media swamped him on both sides as he ran the last three miles unchallenged to the finish line in the stadium amidst thunderous applause from the spectators. After the first 20 athletes made it to the stadium, the euphoria began to die down gradually as some of the athletes came almost unnoticed by even their friends and families.

What captivated my attention was one family that waited at the edge of the forest until their loved one, though tired and wiped out, appeared almost 7 hours after the start of the race. The pump and celebration generated by the friends and family drew the attention of the cops and the media and got the crowd to re-engage as they ran alongside this athlete with placards reading “This is our champion” and “This is our hero” These people were not discouraged that their son was among the last athletes to finish the race, but were excited that he did finish the race.

Jesus too is waiting at the edge, not bothering about when we shall finish, but is excited that we are on course and will finish this Christian race, because we are his champion and we are his hero.

"The Peace of Christ Be With You"

How many times do we say this to each other? Since I usually lead it, I know it is every Sunday. Do we say empty words, or do we really mean it? I truly believe that most of us do wish for the peace of Christ for each other and for ourselves. Think how stressful life is for most people. Just knowing that Christ is always with us and that God is taking care of us should give us enormous peace!

I know we all have been hearing about the war in Ukraine since February 24th. Surely, no one there is really at peace, but I know there actually are people there who trust God implicitly and don't worry about the future. (They are probably few and far between, but I know they are there). How many of us have that kind of trust in God?


So very many people are just "stressed out" these days. We have constant worry about our jobs, our families, our health, and/or our world, in general. Don't misunderstand me - I believe they are legitimate worries; I know we want to trust God, but we just aren't sure. We trust God to a certain point, but we try to take care of things, ourselves, just in case. There is a poem, which I will attach to this, that basically implies that God can't do what we ask because we keep trying to do the task, ourselves. Do we trust in God, or not?

I know I have said it before, but I will say it again - my paternal grandmother believed that it was a sin to worry because it meant we didn't trust God. There is a lot of truth to that! As an employer, when you give someone a task, do you leave it to the

employee to get it done; or do you check up on the work and even try to do it, yourself, because you're not sure it will be done right? When you give ANYONE a task, do you leave it to be done without helping, or do you try to help more than is really needed. Don't give the assignment to someone if you don't trust him/her to do it - including God!!

Even Jesus' disciples had to be told repeatedly, "Peace be with you." They knew Jesus better than anyone, and, yet, they were still uneasy about the future. Are we as insecure as they were? Of course, we are at times, but I hope we trust in Him most of the time.
