The Ten Commandments and The season of Advent

Though it is seldom to see or hear the followers of Jesus Christ taking time out to either teach or recite the Ten Commandments in their homes and churches, it is not a jury verdict saying we are not living according to the commandments of our God. - 4. Remember the Sabbath day by keeping it holy
- 5. Honor your father and your mother
- 6. You shall not murder
- 7. You shall not commit adultery
- 8. You shall not steal
- 9. You shall not give false testimony
- 10. You shall not covet




h, how this story brings tears to my eyes! Its powerful imagery is a good reminder throughout the year, but its relation to the Nativity Story is why it made this list.

Have you noticed that the older we get, the more likely we are to ask for intangibles than tangibles? A child nearly always asks for the newest, most exciting toy (or several of them!). A teenager will probably ask for a really expensive item, like a game system, a bicycle, or, if he's old enough, a car! A college student will probably ask for money, or maybe a trip to somewhere far away from his home. Newly-married people usually want things for their houses. As we become parents, we start to become less selfish; we want to make sure our children have everything they want. The older we get, the more likely we are to ask for good health for ourselves and others, for family get-togethers, or for safety for all our family and friends.

Still, there are many people, even children, who ask for things for others before themselves. There are children who start campaigns to raise money or to collect items or food for

others. Of course, there are many adults who do the same thing, but even they are in the minority.

What are we lacking when we know exactly what WE want for Christmas, but haven't really considered what anyone else wants? Are we lacking maturity, security, thoughtfulness, or just love?

Christmas is supposed to be a time of hope, peace, joy, and love. We who have even a sense of what those feelings are need to pass them along to others. Do you know anyone who will probably be alone during the Christmas holidays? What is the BEST gift you can give that person? Do you think dropping off a pretty package with something nice in it is the best gift you can give, OR do you think that spending time with him or her or inviting him or her to your home for Christmas would be more appreciated. (Of course, a tangible gift that shows them that they are not forgotten is a great gift). I have heard for many years that the Christmas season is the time of the most suicides!! Is there something YOU can do to lower that number?

I pray that all of you will receive (and give) the gifts or hope, peace, joy, and love for Christmas! 'Tis the season!



Lunch from Chick-fil-A will be provided Saturday.


Our registration deadline is January 4th. Please contact me directly with any other questions. We look forward to having you join us for this event and can't wait to see God move in the youth of our community.
