emove the Stones

A man called Lazarus who was a friend of Jesus had died three days before Jesus got to Jericho. At the scene of the grave, Jesus who is playing the role of the priest, was accompanied there by the



crowd which is the congregation to help out the victim who was Lazarus. But there was an obstacle which was the stone, the normal way of burying people at the time in that part of the Middle East.

Jesus told the crowd to remove the stone. He did not ask them to pray, praise or engage one another into a conversation or to analyze and assess the mass and calculate the volume and size of the stone but to remove the stone. In other words, for Jesus to free Lazarus from the grave, the stone must first be removed.

There are some miracles that God cannot or will not do, and which the victims themselves are unable to do except we remove the stone from the victim. Once the congregation removed the stone, Jesus now said a very short prayer. "So they took away the stone. Then Jesus looked up and said, "Father, I thank you that you have heard me. ⁴² I knew that you always hear me, but I said this for the benefit of the people standing here, that they may believe that you sent me." When he had said this, Jesus called in a loud voice, "Lazarus, come out!" ⁴⁴ The dead man came out, his hands and feet wrapped with strips of linen, and a cloth around his face. Jesus said to them, "Take off the grave clothes and let him go." John 11:41-44.

The job of the congregation was to remove the stone while that of Jesus the Priest was to pray. There are some people within our community and family systems who are in a victimized situation like Lazarus without the power, mental strength, education, finances and even physical strength to help themselves out of their situation. They need us as a church to help remove these stones and obstacles in their lives so they can finally make it while the Pastor takes time out to pray for them.

Lazarus could not remove the stone to create space for the miracle to happen, and Jesus needed the stone to be removed so he could perform the miracle. Maybe God is calling you to help pay a health insurance premium for a friend so he can have that knee or back surgery or that kidney transplant. May be God is calling on you to help that nephew or niece with his student loan so he can be debt free to enjoy the American dream; maybe God wants you to help someone have a good car so he can commute to work easily; and maybe God is calling you to help pay someone's drug rehabilitation fee. People can be in victimized situations from no fault of their own making. There are some stones too big and old that might have been preventing this country from moving forward. Some might be ungracious policies put in place by politicians who couldn't careless about the wellbeing of an average American. These stones can be remove from the ballot boxes. God is about to perform a miracle in our community, country, family systems and in our church, but as Christians we must play our part by removing these stones standing as obstacles. Prayer alone is not enough; we must remove the stones first and create a space for the miracle to take place. When the stone was removed, Jesus prayed and called on Lazarus to come forth.

Can you identify other stones holding people from experiencing their miracles? How can you help so these obstacles can be removed so the church can now offer prayers?

After all, if I knew best, I could be God!

Haven't you ever decided to do something for yourself or for someone else and have it backfire? I know you had the best intentions, but you just didn't do the best thing. I seriously doubt that God has done that! I don't believe God makes mistakes! As difficult as it may be, we have to trust that God knows best and will take care of us. As I sang on Sunday, "His eye is on the sparrow, and I know He watches me."
